This edition of the Phargol Horn features an article written by Shadra, Director of Dragon Entertainments Inc., in response to many enquiries we have received regarding careers in Krystonian showbusiness...

My sincerest thanks to those many friends of Krystonia who have written to me suggesting new variety acts for inclusion in our famous entertainment extravaganzas. Many of you kindly offered to perform yourselves free of charge. You have my heartfelt appreciation but we already have a surplus of quality acts on our books still awaiting their first engagement, so I hope the Alaskan Dogs' Choir and the saxophone player from Arkansas will not be too disappointed when I decline their generous offer. I must also advise them – and anyone else who sent mail to Cairn Tor – not to respond to unsolicited mailshots from any dragon calling himself Stoope the Stoopendous offering guaranteed stardom for the price of a bag of cookies paid in advance. But for those of you determined to enter the precarious world of showbiz, I hope you will find the following tips and advice of some use...

Firstly, be brutally honest with yourself about the true extent of your talent. It's one thing making your close friends and family laugh by wiggling your ears in time to music or making your Granny weep tears of pride at your school poetry recital but it's another matter completely to find yourself alone on a stage in front of a paying audience. Ask yourself, would you pay to see you? If the answer is no you would be well advised to stick to entertaining your family and seek an alternative (and safer) profession in some other walk of life. Admittedly, there are one or two acts who have managed to achieve a certain level of popularity precisely because of their complete lack of any talent, but they are very few and far between and, in almost every case, have had the backing of very clever promotional agents. The likes of Merrybean and his Amazing Waltzing Eyebrows and Jasper Disaster Soft Fruit Impersonator are the exception, not the rule.

Secondly, it is often a good idea to look for an angle that captures the public mood at a certain time. This rarely results in superstardom but, given the right set of circumstances, can propel the entertainer from complete obscurity to steady, well paid work overnight. I recall a certain snord, for example, who made a very good living indeed by playing himself in a travelling production which enacted famous Krystonian battle scenes. True, he nightly endured a hostile reception when he appeared on stage and had to suffer the ignominy of several simulated beatings, acts of cowardice and four death scenes in every performance but, at the zenith of the show's popularity, earned himself so much free food that his trotters periodically refused to support his growing girth. Several performances had to be cancelled at short notice and many others lost some of their impact when the supposedly terrifying snord has to be pushed around the stage in a bath chair by two attendant trolles. these problems, every production since which has billed itself as featuring 'Real Snord' has signed him. It is even rumoured that he is now so overweight that he now employs a small team of leaner, meaner snord body-doubles to perform in his stead and takes a generous percentage for doing nothing more than lending his reputation to the part.

Next, you should never underestimate the value of practice and developing new elements to your routines. Jumbly the Juggler would not be in such great demand if his act had not progressed from juggling mud balls. Burning batons, sets of false teeth and even smaller creatures (you may have heard of his trick with baby bobolls) all feature in his programme, and are juggled not just from paw to paw, but in various combinations of paw, tail and snout in a variety of positions from standing to lying flat. True, Jumbly was hatched from his egg with more talent than should fairly be given to any one dragon but I have seen enough cuts and bruises and scorch marks on his hide to know that the applause which inevitably greets his every trick has been earned through many seasons of hard work and dedication. I can also remember watching an old journeyman, with no pretensions of stardom, win himself two fine Maj-Dron brooches by balancing six perfectly round pebbles one atop the other. When I asked him what trickery he had employed he looked more than a little offended and told me that what I had witnessed in a few seconds had taken him since childhood to perfect.

Being realistic about your talent also requires counterbalancing by a good sized helping of self belief. It still amazes me how many performers who have spent seasons trying to convince booking agents of their versatility collapse at the first real audition because they are asked if they can do something just a little different than they are used to. You might be a singer but, if asked if you can dance as well, why not give it a shot? You might even surprise yourself. I recall one act who attended an audition for a temporary Vicious Beast Tamer only to be told that the teeth marks in the resident Tamer had healed more quickly than expected and, therefore, the position was no longer vacant. However, they did have need for a Beast Jockey to ride a half-wide sandbounder in the show's closing pageant. Well, the outcome was not quite as had been expected. After careening around the show ring facing front then back, hanging onto the sandbounder's tail, clasped desperately around its snout and, finally, slipping off the saddle completely and finishing the ride clinging to the beast's underbelly, the performer was signed up immediately as a Stunt Rider.

This is a hard and difficult business and those precious few who eventually achieve superstardom have earned the right to be adored. I hope you achieve your dreams, enjoy the appreciation of a packed house every night and, just occasionally, spare a thought for those of us who work behind the scenes to make your lives easier.

# FALL INTRODUCTIONS

Let me give a run down of what was involved in their creation.

- 3950 and 3951 Proposal and Acceptance: When a very special proposal is offered to a blushing young female dragon, she makes her acceptance. We have always had requests for something that could be used for weddings, anniversaries, and special occasions. This will make a great cake topper. We anticipate these two will be added to many of your collections. The two are meant to be a pair but can be bought separately.
- 3952 Nourak: Poor N'Grall never seemed to have anyone to hang around with. Well, he does now. Meet Nourak. Always up to no good and as sneaky as you can get. Welcome Nourak to N'Grall's hood or cave or something.
- 4001 On Watch (Second in the Timeless Treasures Series): On Watch portrays one of the bookcases in the Obelisk. Keeping a keen watch is an appointed keeper of the books. You see there has been a problem with books and scrolls coming up missing lately. He is on alert to find the culprit. It seems a small giggle can be detected and a mischievous face is appearing over the top. Guess who?
- 1116 Encounter: The Encounter is intriguing in design and story. As N'Grall brings his powerful wings around he pulls Rueggan's hot air balloon toward him. Rueggan tries to adjust to get away but is having great difficulties. High in the clouds they battle to win the upper hand with great meaning to all of Krystonia. (Both 1116 and 4001 involved multiple molds and great craftsmanship.)
- 788-759 Shush and Backpacker: Not be left out once again, we have two wonderful ornaments. Shush and Backpacker. They are dated 1998 on the bottom and will be retired at the end of the year (don't miss Backpacker's friend on his back).


